What does ÁRBOLES stands for?

Assessing Risk of Breast Cancer through Outreach to Latinas with Education and Support

What is the overall goal of the ÁRBOLES training?

This free training program aims to increase your knowledge and confidence in identifying and referring Latinas you work with about cancer genetics and hereditary breast and ovarian cancer. In addition to providing skills for:

- ✦ identification of Latinas at high risk for hereditary breast and ovarian cancer
- ✦ referral and navigation of appropriate Latina patients to genetic services, and
- ✦ communication about cancer risk among Latinas

How long is the overall training?

The overall training is 5 months long; we have a 1.5 day in-person training followed by a four month online training. Our online training is set to begin May 2019. We will also do a 6 month and a 12 month follow-up survey after the training is completed.

How often does the training occur?

ÁRBOLES training occurs 1-2 times a year, with various start dates and locations for the in-person meeting (please check our website for upcoming training dates and locations)

What is the eligibility criteria to participate in the training?

We are looking for native and non-native bilingual English-Spanish speakers currently employed (volunteer) by a clinic, hospital or agency that provides services to Latinos through their role as:

- ✦ promotores,
- ✦ lay health advisors,
- ✦ patient navigators,
- ✦ community outreach, or
- ✦ health educators
